Pig Biosecurity Planning Checklist

Protect your pigs from pests and diseases



Know your risks! A **BIOSECURITY PLAN**, when followed will help you manage your biosecurity risks. This pig biosecurity checklist represents best practice to protect you pigs from the introduction and spread of pests, weeds and disease.

To develop your pig biosecurity plan, tick \mathbf{Y} for the practices you currently do, \mathbf{N} for those you don't and $\mathbf{N/A}$ for those that don't apply to your current situation, noting it is recommended to review your plan whenever your biosecurity risks change.

Record people movements into and out of your pig areas?			
Recommend workers and family members be vaccinated for the flu (influenza) each year?			
Restrict access of people who are sick (respiratory, gastro) to your pigs?			
Ask your visitors about what contact they have had with other animals in the 48 hours before entering your piggery?			
Ask your visitors if they have recently returned from overseas travel?

Restrict access of vehicles and equipment to your pigs and pig areas?			
Clean and disinfect equipment before it enters your pig areas?			
Wash pig transport vehicles between loads?

For trucks/drivers that are not from your farm, do you manage loading/ unloading areas to avoid people moving into clean pig areas?

Ensure farm workers, family members and property residents are aware of the symptoms of Japanese encephalitis virus (JEV) and how to keep themselves protected (e.g. PPE, vaccinated)?

Know to call your veterinarian or the EAD watch hotline (1800 675 888) if you see unusual signs of disease or suspect an emergency pig disease?			
Have emergency contacts displayed for easy access?			
Think about how you might:			
Hold pigs for at least 4-weeks if movements were not allowed			
Humanely euthanise pigs on-site if required.			
Dispose of pig carcasses if required (e.g. burial, composting, incineration, delivery to licensed local tip)
